Emergency Supply Kit Checklist

You can be prepared by creating an emergency supply kit. Include items for yourself, your family, and your pets for three days minimum, possibly a week. Keep your kit in a sturdy, easy to carry backpack or duffel bag in case you need to evacuate.

WATER AND FOOD
